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Baron Sakatani, the new Japanese adviser to the Ministry of Finance, is quoted by the Japanese News Agency as saying:

"I will not advise the Chinese government to adopt the gold standard unless I am quite certain that the gold standard will do China good. As the present financial conditions in China are detrimental to the interests of Japan, so we Japanese must assist the Chinese to reform their currency as soon as possible. The chief thing is the reorganization of the paper money and China's domestic and foreign loans. There is no use to talk of a real gold standard for China until we have actually reorganized her paper money and made the silver coins a dependable currency. It is estimated that about 800,000,000 new silver coins are required for circulation in the Chinese money markets and for this China must have further loans from the Powers, especially Japan and the United States, since the other powers are not in a position to lend her any real help on account of the war."

Baron Sakatani is expected to arrive in Peking this week.
