The Economic Aspect.

Addressing a meeting of women yesterday in the Union C urch Hall, under the auspices of the Shanghai Women's Christian Temperance Union, Miss Laura White dealt with "The Economic Aspect of Commercialized Vice." Mrs. W. L. Merriman presided over a large attendance. The authorities of the anesker wore

The authorities of the speaker were the various reports of different Vice Commissions, notably the Rockefeller Commissions.

She quoted the assertion of the Commission on European vice to the effect that the coloseal vice business was deliberately cultivated for the sake of its own commercial profit, A very large constituent of what has been its own commercial profit, A very large constituent of what has been called the irresistible demands of human nature are nothing, but deliberate suggestion and stimulation by slochel, late hours and sensuous smusements, all sedulously worked up by the basiness entrepreueurs of vice. An artificial supply of prostitutes is deliberately and resourcefully forced on the world market, and then an artificial demand worked up to consume it. Creating the artificial demand are the cabaret and suggestive moving picture shows; the low theatre amusement halls, etc. The main agencies being the com-munoity dance house affliated with the disorderly saloon. Profits on Vice: the millions spent in the different classes of Brothels, Parlour Houses, etc. Profits of the Street Walker. Profits by the sale of liquor. Profits by the sale of drugs. Profits by the consers. The Cadet, The Madame, and Procures. The Street versitues. In summing up the speaker remark-dit that although she had confined her exper to a discussion of the uubliev-ble sum spaid out by the society for the taxee of the prostitute, the account is not so simple as that; for we must not iverlook the lose involved in the pronomic unproductiveness of this army of women new up in the millions, whose one function seems to be to poison the world. Of he total cost only the roughest guesses an be made, but it would be noted that very estimate given that afternoon unokly ran up into the millions. Losch, for example, reckons the cost of prostitution to Germany as between hree hundred and five hundred million marks. This outlay may be contrasted with the entire cost of the Prussian bohool system, elementary, technical and professional. The entire system shows budget of less than 200,000,000 marks.
