JAPANESE TRAINING CHINESE TROOPS.

According to the Chinese Press, the Peking Government has sanctioned the formation of an officers' training corps, in pursuance of the newlyconcluded agreement between China and Jupan, for the purpose of training the Chinese Army on the Japanese General Yu Chin-ho has been chosen to be the Commander and the chief craining master will be Mr. Sakashi, a Japanese officer, assisted by 12 other Japanese officers and non-commissioned officers. The inauguration ceremony of this corps was to take place on The scheme of train-February 15th. ing will be divided into three periods each of four months, or to be completed in one year. During each period, 2,000 officers are to be trained, by drafting one or two officers from every company who shall be transferred to Peking to undergo this work. The officers of all the divisions of the Chineso Army will have to be trained the Japanese plan without exception. The training ground is situatated at Huangshi or the Yellow Temple on the outskirts of Peking.
