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On the campus in front of J y H. Neff Hall at the University of Missouri there is a sun dial which bears this inscription: "I have set thee a watchman." The men above, representing Missouri's journalistic family in Shanghai, learned the fundamentals of their protession under the esteemed Dean Walter Williams, founder of the first school of journalism in the world, and now president of the University of Missouri. Presentation of the pair of stone lions by the National Government of China to Missouri's renowned school is a tribute to Dean Williams' ability in sending out watchmen.
