1932 TOBACCO TRADE OF SHANGHAI.

Leaf tobacco imports into Shanghai from the United States during the eleven months period ended November 30 totalled 59,000,000 lbs., a heavy drop from the 1931 figures which for that entire year totalled 143,605,000 lbs. The reduction in 1932 was due to the fact that large stocks of old crop leaf were on hand at the beginning of the year and large quantities of the 1931 crop from America were shipped early and arrived in Shanghai before the end of that year, whereas with the 1932 crop shipments were later and the bulk of the shipments to China have yet to arrive. Extremely low prices prevailed during the first several months of the year but with the shorter crop in the United States in 1932 with rising prices Shanghai importers have been able to move considerable quantities of the overstocks of old crop leaf at better prices than prevailed earlier in the year, though losses had to be taken on most of it due to the very high prices obtaining in the home market during the year of purchase. Stocks of American leaf in Shanghai are considered normal for current requirements and importers expect to be able to supply a normal demand though a shortage of American leaf may possibly develop in the month or so prior to receipt of the 1933 crop if an unexpected volume of demand develops this year. The importers of leaf tobacco in Shanghai reorganized in November 1932 the Shanghai American Leaf Tobacco Board of Trade and are taking steps to adopt a uniform policy for the extension of credit on leaf sales which should greatly assist the marketing situation. China's bright flue cured crop for 1932 is estimated at 50,000,000 lbs. for Shantung, 25,000,000 lbs. for Honan, and about 5,000,000 lbs. for Anhwei province, or a total of 80,000,000 lbs., or about 6,000,000 lbs. below last year's production. The Shantung crop is regarded as inferior as to quality and color though prices obtained by the farmers were about the same as last year, when a speculative market with prices perhaps higher than warranted prevailed. The 1932 Honan crop is regarded as excellent as to color though not so good as to body. Very little of it has yet appeared on the Shanghai market though such as has arrived has been grabbed up at good prices.

Cigarette imports continue to fall off, the figure for all China for eleven months ending November 30 amounting to only 664,000,000 pieces as compared with 2,942,000,000 pieces in the twelve months of 1932. Unfavorable silver exchange, the high tariff, and the development of brands locally which are comparable in blend to the popular imported brands is having the effect of reducing this trade to small proportions.

A new tariff rate on leaf tobacco announced toward the end of the year and effective January 10, 1933, Teliminate former classes B and C (Tariff No. 388) and substitutes a single class B which includes virtually all American cigarette tobacco at a new tariff rate of Gold Units 4 per picul, which is equivalent to \$1.20 U.S. currency per 100 pounds. The new schedule eliminates any question of the value of cigarette tobacco for classification and removes any question on the part of customs appraisers as to the tariff rate applicable, hence is regarded both by the trade and the Customs as a better arrangement than that which existed prior to the change. It loes not represent an increase in tariff but a mean between the two rates previously in force.

Detailed statistics of imports of Cigarettes and Leaf Tobacco into China for September and for January through September, 1932, and for Leaf Tobacco and Cigarettes into Shanghai for October and November, 1932, are attached to this report.
