April and market conditions in Shanghai during May was forwarded June 11:

"Total China lumber imports April 30.6 million board feet compared 19.5 million sapely. Imports hardwood totalled 9.3 million feet compared 4.5 million feet sapely. Unistates supplied .3% Philippine Islands 38% Netherlands India 23% Japan 13% British North Borneo 13% Canada 2%. Imports softwood totalled 21.3 million feet compared 15 million sapely. Unistates supplied 45% Canada 41% Japan 12%. Imports sleepers during April totalled 105,000 pieces compared 154,000 sapely. Arrivals Shanghai during May totalled 16.7 million feet consisting 4.3 million feet Oregon pine hemlock and cottonwood logs 362,000 feet piling 253,000 feet sleepers balance rough Oregon pine and flooring. Shanghai stocks estimated 20 million feet. Local demand satisfactory during month with fair amount of orders placed for July August delivery. Shipping space slightly easier. American prices somewhat lower due accumulation stocks at mills. Local price slightly weakened with first grade being quoted at yuan 160 per M. British and Chinese Corporation Limited local financing concern has issued tender on behalf Nanking Shanghai Railway for 129.7 thousand sleepers Douglas fir creosoted with alternative Jarrah sleepers. Tender specifies articles must be products of British Empire."

Limited activity continued in the Shanghai market during May with a fair amount of orders being placed for July-August delivery. Increased arrivals during May did not result in a corresponding increase in stocks on hand at the end of the month, indicating a slight improvement in the consumption over April. While the lumber business is still considered to be well below normal the trade is in a sound position, collections are good and credit is slightly easier.
