I am getting together a contact list of all the people I met on my South China trip, which I shall place in the files here and give you a copy for possible use by other Trade Commissioners or other members of our organization who may visit South China. I feel that such a list may be useful and will greatly facilitate the efforts of someone else (or myself) on such a trip in the future.

1/ I made notes on my interviews with many of the people and as these notes will probably be of some interest to you, I am enclosing, herewith, such of them as I have been able to write up. I will forward other data just as soon as I can get time to do it but I do not want to hold up the whole thing until I can write up my notes in full as it may be some days before I can do so.

2/ I enclose, herewith, copy of a report which I have prepared on Canton and which I am issuing today in the form of a supplement to our November Monthly Report.

As conditions were so entirely new to me in that part of the country and I had to interview people who were absolute strangers to me, although I had letters of introduction to them, I do not feel that I have produced a report which is either as comprehensive or complete as I should have liked to have made it. Therefore, I have not dignified it by the term "Report" but have simply called it "Notes on Conditions in Canton". This report will go off on the Seattle boat leaving here Saturday, December 17.

Even if I had made a conclusive and completely comprehensive report, you will see that it would not have been of much avail as the Canton situation has turned upside down in the last forty-eight hours. At any rate, whether you consider the report good, bad or indifferent I feel that I absorbed a

PEOPLE MET AND INTERVIEWED ON SOUTH CHINA TRIP

November 13 to December 9, 1927.

by A. Bland Calder, Trade Commissioner.

Capt. J. M. Enoch, Commander of the South China Patrol, U.S. Asiatic Fleet. I took with me a letter of introduction to him from Admiral Bristol, but had an opportunity to meet him only at the American Thanksgiving Day celebration at Ling Nan University, Canton. He was leaving the next morning at 4 a.m. for Hongkong and Swatow. Hence I did no more than turn over to him at Hongkong through the Consulate our latest Monthly Report and wrote him a note saying we should be pleased to place him on the list to receive it regularly if he wished. I have not heard from him in acknowledgment or reply as yet. His flagship is the U.S.S. "Ashville" stationed usually at Canton or Hongkong but visiting all ports as far north as Foochow.

Mr. A. Morley Horder, Manager, Connell Bros. Company, Hongkong.

Mr. Horder showed me many courtesies, gave me a good deal of his time and many helpful slants on South China business conditions and on the trade in fruits and foodstuffs lines generally. Mr. Horder is a naturalized American citizen of British origin. Among other things of interest he told me that despite the fact that the American Consulate General works on commercial subjects to some extent no representative of the Consulate General had ever called on him in an official capacity, either for information or to express any interest in his business activities. He said I was the second Department of Commerce man to call upon him, the first being Trade Commissioner Watson a couple of years ago. He appeared to be complimented that a government representative should express interest in his business and told me some of the difficulties he suffers by way of competitive methods employed by other concerns. He asked me for certain information on the trade in cattle bones and I will supply it to him from my past business experience in handling this particular commodity in Shanghai. He introduced me to the Secretary of the Hongkong (British) General Chamber of Commerce, a personal friend of his. My approach to Mr. Horder was by means of a letter of introduction supplied by Mr. S. C. Kingsbery, Manager, Shanghai, for the same company.

Dr. Jas. M. Henry, Provost, Ling Nan University, (formerly Canton Christian College). I carried with me a letter of introduction to Dr. Henry, from Mr. George Fitch, Shanghai Y.M.C.A., and visited the University on three occasions during my stay, once on Thanksgiving Day, when I attended the American Thanksgiving Day services and picnic luncheon held at the University, and visited the silk experimental station and learned of the efforts being made to improve South China reeling methods, and to develop a strain of hardier worms, disease free, so as to put South China silk back on the American market. I also saw some of the work of the agricultural department in the growing of yacatz, pine apple and mulberry.

I visited the University again on Sunday, December 4, in company with Mr. Tse Tsok Kai, a member of the Chinese Board of Directors of the institution, met Dr. Henry again and discussed with him at some length

the plan under which the institution was turned over to Chinese control. Dr. Henry explained that the property owned by the American Board of Trustees of the College was turned over to the Chinese Board of Directors at an annual rental of \$1. a year, that the only contribution now being made to the running expenses of the institution from the American Board of Trustees is the funds for salaries of the American personnel. Peculiarly enough, at this state of the conversation between myself and Dr. Henry, Mr. Tse suggested that it would be a good idea if the American Board of Trustees would gradually allot this money for Chinese faculty personnel and gradually reduce the American personnel. Dr. Henry replied flatly that that was something the American Board of Trustees would not do. It appears that some part of the money invested in buildings in past years was raised by the Chinese personnel of the school from among over-seas Chinese, the Agricultural School building in particular having been contributed by Chinese in Cuba, Jamaica and Panama. Also the present overhead of the institution is raised from Chinese sources, only a fraction of it being raised from tuition fees. Certain amounts have been secured from the Canton Government. Dr. Henry said that the Chinese Board had succeeded up to the present in getting something like \$46,000 from Government sources. The Canton Government is also supporting the sericultural experiment station at the College, now in charge of a Chinese, Mr. C.P. Wong. The Canton Government contributes monthly an amount of \$3000 (local currency) for the work of this station, the plant having been turned over to the Chinese for the purpose. Canton silk is rapidly losing its position in the American market and is giving way to Shanghai and Japan silk.

A set of experiments is now being conducted in this station to endeavor to develop a strain of worm which will show hardier tendencies and be less susceptible to disease. There is a heavy loss now by disease. Many worms spin only half a cocoon and then die. Some do not spin at all. The proportion of waste silk produced in Canton to the finished raw silk (reeled) is apparently considerably greater than elsewhere. Experiments are also being carried on here in the way of improving methods and species of mulberry production.

I had tiffin on Monday, December 5, at the University with Dr. Henry and discussed many other features of the institution. He told me about the Over-seas Department where the sons of Chinese resident abroad

in Singapore, the Malay Peninsula, Java, the Philippines, Cuba, and South America, are given special training so they may catch up with native born Chinese in the Chinese written and spoken language. Many children of Chinese resident abroad are handicapped when they return to China by lack of sufficient knowledge of the Chinese language to qualify for work in their proper grade in the various departments of the University. There are something over 700 students now at Ling Nan University.

Dr. Henry told me something also of the many indignities and difficulties suffered by the American personnel of this institution during the labor and strike troubles of 1925 and 1926.

Dr. Henry stated that so far the operation of the institution under a Chinese President and Board of Directors, the entire American personnel being subordinate thereto, has worked out very well, and that the relations of the Americans with the students are better than at any time in the past five years. Also that at present the students are devoting their time strictly to their studies rather than to political activities and that this phase of the situation is better than at any time in the past five years. He foresees no difficulties at present. The institution is now receiving its major support from Chinese sources, the only American contribution being that of the salaries and furloughs of the American members of the faculty. Other Americans with more sceptical ideas expressed the view that this Chinese support would be likely to peter out in the course of time, and that there are already indications that certain of the Chinese concerned are not so enthusiastic over the continued prospect of having to secure the major operating expense funds from Chinese sources rather than from contributions made from America. In fact there are indications that the Chinese Board is making and will make efforts to secure independently from American sources more American support than is granted by the American Board of Trustees. Apparently there is no objection on the part of the American Trustees to the Chinese Board doing whatever it can to secure funds independently in America.

Mr. Loy Chang, Assistant Manager, Bank of China, Canton. American returned student.

Mr. H. L. Yung, Yee Cheong Co., Ltd., (met him at luncheon with Mr. Chang) engages in export of Chinese matting and other commodities, also in general import business. Complains that American manufacturers will not give him sufficient credit facilities. His brother or cousin is compradore of the Chartered Bank of India, Australia & China. Address of firm is French Bldg., (Banque de l'Indo Chine Bldg), Queens Road Central. Wants American connections but would want us to recommend that he be extended credit, which we could not very well do.

Mr. Wang Cheng Hsu, brother of C.T.Wang, and Manager of the Ho Hong Bank, Hongkong. Met him at luncheon with Mr. Chang and Mr. Yung. I had met him, previously at Rotary Club in Shanghai. Has spent some years in Singapore and is an American returned student.

Mr. L. S. Kwok, Assistant Manager, Wing On Department Store, Hongkong. Graduate of Canton Christian College, now Ling Nan University. Since the change in administration of this institution he has been made a member of the Chinese Board of Directors of the University.

Mr. Li Tse Fong, Manager, Bank of East Asia, Hongkong.

Sir Shou Shen Chow, Member of the Hongkong Legislative Council, Chairman of Board of Directors of the Bank of East Asia and numerous other affiliations. Was formerly a Peking official. Graduated from Columbia University 1883. Was honored with above title by British Crown. He is one of two Chinese members of the Hongkong Legislative Council.

Sir Robert Hotung, one of the most prominent Chinese in the Colony, formerly compradore of the Hongkong & Shanghai Banking Corporation, his son now being compradore. He is really Eurasian but assumes Chinese clothes. He introduced me to his nephew.

Mr. Ho Leung, compradore for Jardine, Matheson & Co., Hongkong, a prominent young business man of Hongkong, also Eurasian, wears foreign clothes and speaks British English, in fact more British than Chinese in both appearance and speech. He is familiar with China produce trade to a considerable extent, but not especially communicative.

Hon. R. H. Kotewall, R. M. Kotewall & Co., Importers, exporters and General merchants, China Bldg., Queens Road Central, Hongkong, member of Hongkong Legislative Council. Mr. Kotewall and Sir Shou Shen Chow jointly entertained me at luncheon, to which the American Consul General, Mr. Tredwell, and Consul Shantz were also invited guests.

Dear Admiral Bristol:

You may be interested in more details as to "who's who" among the Chinese guests at the tea given in your honor yesterday afternoon at the Majestic Hotel:

1. David Au, an Australian Chinese, General Manager of the Sincere & Co. Department Stores.
2. Luther Jee, Manager of the Peacock Motion Picture Corporation. Mr. Jee is also President of the Rotary Club and a member of the Committee of the American University Club. He was born in San Francisco and is a graduate of the University of California.
3. Dr. Fong F. Sec, English Editor, Commercial Press, Ltd. The Commercial Press is the largest printing and text book company in the whole of China. It has fifty or sixty branches in addition to its main establishment at Shanghai. It is capitalized at Max. \$6,000,000. Dr. Fong is President of the American University Club and actively associated with many other associations and organizations in Shanghai. He is a graduate of the University of California.
4. Dr. H. H. Kung, President of Tai Ku College, an Oberlin institution in Shansi. Dr. Kung is a descendant of Confucius; his wife is a sister of Mrs. Sun Yat-sen. He was, until recently, Minister of Industries under the Nationalist Government. He is well informed on political matters.
5. Dr. C. T. Wang. Dr. Wang was at one time President of the Senate in the Chinese Parliament, Minister of Foreign Affairs, Premier Chinese representative at the Versailles Peace Conference, etc., etc. He is President of the China Good Roads Association and identified with the Nationalist party but with a group not now in control. He is a Yale graduate.

6. Dr. H. C. Mei. Dr. Mei was born in Honolulu and until recently carried American citizenship. He is one of the leading Chinese attorneys-at-law. Mrs. Mei has been President of the Chinese Y.W.C.A. and is very active in Chinese womens work.
7. Li Ming. Mr. Li is General Manager of the Chekiang Industrial Bank. He is one of the ablest of the modern Chinese bankers. He was educated in Japan but speaks English fluently. He is very frank in his opinions regarding Chinese affairs and a useful person for consultations on such matters.
8. Sing-loh Hsu. Mr. Hsu is Manager of the National Commercial Bank. This institution some time ago purchased the old Kalee Hotel on Kiangse Road and has plans for erecting what will be the largest and most modern Chinese bank in China.
9. Ralph Sun, Manager of the Chung Foo Union Bank. Mr. Sun is a graduate of Browns University. In addition to being manager of a bank, he controls and manages a number of Chinese flour mills. He is well informed on industrial matters.
10. Pan Ching-poo, Compradore of Jardine, Matheson & Co., the largest British general merchandising house in China. Mr. Pan is quite wealthy and is one of the better type of the compradore class.
11. P. K. Chu, Secretary, Worlds' Chinese Students' Federation. Mr. Chu is very active in Chinese student affairs. He is a rather aggressive type but not popular with many Chinese as he is rather lacking in tact and is not possessed of a very pleasing personality. However, he is quite influential in certain directions and a useful citizen.
12. Tsuyee Pei and Shun-Shih King, Manager and Assistant Manager,
13. respectively, of the Bank of China, the largest Chinese banking institution in China. Mr. Pei was until recently, Manager of the Hongkong branch of the Bank of China. Mr. King has been identified with the Shanghai office of the Bank for a number of years. Mr. King is an American college graduate and is very well informed on Chinese banking methods.
14. H. Y. Moh. Mr. Moh is one of the leading authorities on cotton and cotton mills in China. He is President of the Chinese Cotton Goods Exchange and is also at the head of a number of Chinese cotton mills. He is American educated and is well informed on Chinese industrial and commercial matters.

15. Dr. Hu Shih. Until quite recently Dr. Hu Shih was Professor of Philosophy in the National University of Peking. He is a prominent educationalist and is spoken of as the Father of the Chinese Renaissance. He has recently completed a tour of Europe and America and is one of the outstanding figures in educational circles in China. His address in Shanghai is 492 Jessfield Road.
16. Dr. David Yui, Chairman of the National Committee of the Y.M.C.A. Dr. Yui is known very well in America as he has lectured very extensively in the United States. He is a very aggressive Nationalist and is prominent in the Nationalist movement among students in China.
17. Dr. Herman C. Liu, Secretary, National Committee, Y.M.C.A. Dr. Liu is a co-worker with David Yui.
18. W. Yinson Lee. Mr. Lee is an Australian-born Chinese and is a very enterprising and active man in handling certain important products in China. He is probably handicapped through lack of capital but deserves credit for his enterprise and success in a modern business way. He is responsible for putting on the Chinese Fashion Show here about a year ago, under the auspices of the Y's Men's Club of which he is President. This show netted Mex.\$10,000 which was used for charitable purposes.
19. K. Huang, Electrical Engineer, associated with the China Electric Company, an American concern. Mr. Huang is an American college graduate.
20. S. D. Ren. Mr. Ren is one of the modern trained Chinese business men and operates his own company known as the S. D. Ren Company. He is an American college graduate. His wife is an American.
21. Bang How. Mr. How is an English Secretary of the Commercial Press. He is a prominent member of the Shanghai Rotary Club.
22. K. H. Lin and S. V. Zan, represent the older school of Chinese merchants but may be rated as aggressive. They are members of the standing committee of the Chinese General Chamber of Commerce as is also Mr. H. Y. Moh, who is mentioned above.
23. S. S. Feng, Chinese paper merchant; Managing director of the China Merchants' Steam Navigation Co. Mr. Feng is the leading member of the standing committee of the Chinese General Chamber of Commerce.

25. V. Fong Lam. Mr. Lam is at the head of Lam, Glines & Co., an American-Chinese concern handling imports and exports. It is rather a small company from a financial viewpoint.
26. T. B. Chang, Editor of the Shun Pao, the largest Chinese newspaper having a circulation of about 100,000.
27. P. B. Sze. Mr. Sze is President of the Sintoan Overseas Trading Co. This is a Chinese company, well financed and backed by a number of very responsible Chinese capitalists. Mr. Sze is a very able man in foreign import trade.
28. Lee Tsz Kwang, Manager of the Kuo Wen News Agency. This news agency is probably the most advanced of Chinese associations for the distribution of news in the Chinese press.
29. T. K. Ho, Professor of Economics at Kwang Hua University. This University is located at Great Western Road beyond the Columbia Country Club.
30. J. G. Lock, Director of Wing On Co. Mr. Lock is an Australian Chinese and very well informed on the affairs of the company.
31. Kwok Bew is the Managing Director of the Wing On Co. He expressed his regrets at not being able to be present as also those of his wife's and two daughters', all of whom had previous engagements.
32. F. T. Young, General Manager of Wing On Co. This concern did last year about Mex. \$15,000,000 worth of business and is the largest Chinese department store in China.

Among the Chinese women present were the following:

Mrs. Bank How; Mrs. Luther Jee; Mrs. W. Yinson Lee; Mrs. H. H. Kung; Mrs. H. C. Mei; Mrs. Pan Ching-poo; Mrs. Herman C. Liu and Mrs. S. V. Ren (American). Dr. Fong F. See's wife was occupied with another engagement, otherwise she would have been there.

You will note there were not among the Chinese guests any of the active Chinese officials. I purposely avoided extending invitations to any officials, taking it for granted that you would meet these on other occasions. The function was gotten up within a few days notice so that there were a number of Chinese of importance in the non-official community in Shanghai who were unable

to accept my invitation because of previous engagements. However, the group which was gathered represented a very good cross section of the upper crust of the non-official community of Shanghai. Through these individuals you will be able to make such other contacts among the Chinese as you may desire.
