They next shipped to Saigon and continued their journey by road as far as Halphong and then attempted to finoceed through China by road as well. They got as far as Nanning in Kwangai, province, but due to heavy rails, they found the roads impassable and returned to Indo-China whore they shipped for Hong-kong, and then caught the s.s. "President Cleveland" for Shanghai.

The couple left Shanghai by the President Cleveland for Japan where they will disembark at Kobe, whence they will inotor to Yokohama. After a short stay in the latter place, they will once more take ship for Scattle or San Francisco, and will then make jan extended tour of the United States, including a visit to the Chicago World Fair which opens on June 1.
