PAGEANT OF SINO-AMERICAN RELATIONS

- 1785-The Empress of China, the first American ship in the China trade upon its return to New York, completed its round trip to Canton.
- 1786-The Continental Congress commissioned the first American Consul to Canton who was also the first Foreign Consul appointed to China.
- 1830-The first American missionary arrived in China.
- 1840-Beginning of the Clipper Ship era.
- 1843-The first American envoy was sent to China.
- 1844-The first American treaty with China was signed.
- 1852-Between 1784 and 1852, silver bullion and specie shipped to China from America aggregated U.S. \$180,000,000.
- 1855-Eclipse of clipper ships by iron clad vessels upset America's hopes of continued pre-eminence in China waters.
- 1867-The Pacific Mail Steamship Company inaugurated its Trans-Pacific fleet.
- 1871-1875—The first Chinese educational mission (120 students) sent to the United States, in four installments.
- 1877-Russell and Co. (American) sold its fleet of China steamers to a Chinese company.
- 1898-The American flag was raised over the Philippine Islands.
- 1899-The Hay doctrine of an open-door policy for China proclaimed.
- 1905-The Trans-Pacific cable was completed.
- 1908-The first installment of the American Boxer Indemnity (U.S.\$12,000,000) was returned.
- 1910-Pacific Coast chambers of commerce sent the first American commercial mission to China.
- 1911--America was first nation to recognize the Chinese Republic.
- 1914-The Panama Canal was opened, shortening the distance between Atlantic ports and China,
- 1922-The Nine-Power Treaty was concluded at the Washington Conference.
- 1924-The Robert Dollar Steamship Co. inaugurated its round the world service.
- 1925-America returned the balance (U.S.\$12,500,000) of its Boxer Indemnity.
- 1928-America was the first nation to recognize China's tariff autonomy.
- 1928-A Sino-American company inaugurated commercial aviation in China,
- 1930-Wireless communications established between China and the United States.
- 1934-America ranked first in China's foreign trade,
- 1935-America sanctioned the independence of the Philippine Islands.
- 1935-The "China Clipper" inaugurates America's Trans-Pacific air-service.
- 1936-May 22, first two-way radio broadcast between China and America.
- 1936-October 23, "China Clipper" landed in Hongkong, where connection is made with C.N.A.C. air network, marking extension of American Trans-Pacific air service to Asiatic Mainland.
- 1937-April 27, China-United States Air Clipper Service opened.
- 1937-May 19, China-United States Radio-Telephone Service inaugurated.
- 1939—February 18, Radio Station W6XBE, with Asia Beam for transmitting American Programs to Orient, inaugurated at opening of Golden Gate Exposition, at Treasure Island, San Francisco, California.
