Activities of the Foreign Trade Association of China

The head office of the Association was moved to shanging

During the war years, the bulk of China's trade passed through the hands of the Government in the form of barter trading or Government-controlled enterprises as a wartime expediency. To offset this monopolistic tendency and to protect the interest of private trading, it was considered necessary by merchants in the wartime Capital to organize among themselves so that their voice might be heard on matters regarding China's postwar commercial policy and trade practices.

In the meantime, Mr. Chow Ling, then Chairman of the Foreign Trade Commission of the Ministry of Finance, appreciating the need of such an organization, worked out concrete plans to set up the Foreign Trade Association of China, calling for increased cooperation between the Government and businessmen—particularly between exporters, importers, manufacturers, bankers, etc. during the immediate postwar period.

Mr. Chow's proposal, with its stress on promoting China's private trade relations with foreign countries won immediate and whole-hearted support from Government and many business and industrial executives in "Free China." In October, 1944, the Association was inaugurated at Chungking, with Mr. Chow Ling as Chairman of the Board of Directors, and Mr. Koo Keng-yu as the executive secretary.

The Chinese name of this Association used to be "中國進出口貿易協會", but since August, 1948, it has been changed into "中國國際貿易協會".

NON-PARTISAN BODY

Shortly after it registered with the Ministry of Social Affairs, the Association was also recognized by the Ministry of Economic Affairs as a legitimate non-partisan organization of a national character for the purpose of promoting China's foreign trade rela-

tions. The head office of the Association was moved to Shanghai in 1946 with its present address at Hamilton House, 170 Kiangse Road.

ORGANIZATION COMES IN CONTROL OF THE PROPERTY AND ASSESSED OF THE PROPERTY OF The highest authority of this Association is vested in the general meeting of members, which elects a Board of Directors and a Supervisory Committee to attend to the affairs of the Association. Special committees are set up and specialists, both members and non-members, are invited to study the special affairs of this Association as well as technical problems related to the import and export business. BRANCH OFFICES

Among the branches of the Association established in China are the Szechwan Branch (at Chungking), Yunnan Branch (at Kunming), Kwangtung Branch (at Canton) Northeast Branch (at Mukden) and Tientsin Branch. The Association is now also preparing to establish branches at Tsingtao, Hankow, Wuchow, and Swatow.

The Association has also established branch offices at Hongkong, and Calcutta, and representatives have been sent to station at New York, London, Manila, Java, Singapore, Bangkok, Australia and South Africa.

EXPORT EXHIBITION

In conjunction with the Shanghai Chamber of Commerce and Shanghai importers and exporters guild, the Association held an Export Exhibition at the Chinese Y.M.C.A. in October, 1946, with more than 200 factories participating.

TRADE IMPROVEMENT RECOMMENDATIONS

Among other things, the Association proposed during war years that Chinese exports be shipped to Allied countries aboard the airplanes which brought in military supplies to "Free China.' Another proposal made by the Association and accepted by the Government was to permit exporters to use the foreign exchange to buy imports to China. It also presented to the Government recommendations for the abolition of monopoly on tung oil, bristles, tea, raw silk and wool.

After the war, the Association's efforts also contributed to the reopening of the foreign exchange market, the abolition of export tariff, the extension of loans to exporters, readjustment of the Shanghai Harbor, postponement of the export licensing system.

LIAISON WORK

Close liaison work was maintained between the Association and the important government authorities concerned, as well as the chambers of commerce at various localities in China. Some 150 Chinese commercial attaches and consuls have been invited to become advisers of the Association. In the meantime, the Association has rendered assistance to help establish importers and exporters' guilds at various cities.

NATIONAL FOREIGN TRADE CONVENTION

From September 18 to 21, 1947, the National Foreign Trade Convention, being the first of its kind in China, was held in Shanghai, under the joint sponsorship of the Association and the National Federated Chambers of Commerce. A total of 128 proposals were passed and submitted to the Government for consideration.

• TRADE DIRECTORY

Among other undertakings of the Association are the publication of the 1947 edition of the Directory of Importers and Exporters in China, which work has been entrusted by the Ministry of Economic Affairs.

CHINA TRADE MONTHLY

As an added means to impart information at its disposal and to draw trade circles at home and abroad closer and closer together, the Association in January, 1947 started the publication of the "CHINA TRADE MONTHLY," which is the only English journal devoted to the advancement of the foreign trade of China.

1948 PROGRAMS

INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS LUNCHEON

With a view to promoting direct personal contacts between Chinese and foreign businessmen interested in foreign trade; to foster better understanding and closer co-operation between local businessmen with Government authorities interested in Sino-foreign trade relations; and to afford frequent opportunities for local businessmen to freely discuss current business problems and make recommendations to Government authorities on appropriate measures to be taken vis-a-vis changing business conditions, the Association had sponsored the International Businessmen's Luncheon, to be held on the first Wednesday of each month beginning from May 1948. People with the following qualifications, regardless of nationality, may be invited to participate:

- (a) Responsible officers of firms of recognized standing.
- (b) Government officials in charge of foreign trade.
- (c) Chinese and foreign economists and trade experts.
- (d) Senior officers of Appointed Banks.

LECTURES

In conjunction with the University of Shanghai, the Association has been sponsoring, since March 16 this year, a series of lectures on timely trade subjects to instil into the public the importance of China's foreign trade. The following is a schedule of the lectures:

MANUFACTURERS' CATALOGUE

In addition to preparing the 1948 edition of the Directory of Importers and Exporters in China, the Association will also publish a Chinese Manufacturers' Catalogue with a view to introducing the Chinese exports to the world.

CREDIT INFORMATION

For the purpose of preserving the reputation of Chinese traders, the Association, in conjunction with the banks operated by its members, has planned to institute investigations into the credit of factories. The credit investigation will be commenced this year.

TRADE LIBRARY

The establishment of a library to meet the need of businessmen and students of economics and business administration represents another project of the Association's 1948 program, which is to be undertaken with the cooperation of some schools in Shanghai.

PARTICIPATION IN TRADE FAIRS

Efforts to help Chinese manufacturers to participate in the Milan International Trade Fair and Canadian Trade Fair were also made by the Association in conjunction with National Federated Chambers of Commerce as well as other commercial and industrial organizations concerned.

While no effort was spared to facilitate the Chinese participants to make a successful trip, the Central Bank of China was requested to accord the necessary assistance by extending loans to finance the exhibitors. The Bank was further requested to permit the participants to use half of the foreign exchange to be surrendered for purchasing imports on their return trip.
